This year's ArchiTours will visit well-designed buildings and will include a public forum for the first time

ou can take a peep into some of Singapore's most welldesigned houses in this year's ArchiTours. The tours, which will be

held over three Saturdays, starting on Saturday, will take visitors on a tour of private homes and commercial buildings that are normally restricted to the public.

The sites include an eco-house off Balestier Road, which won an award for its green features, such as its solar panel roof, and a house in Jalan Rukam at Upper Thomson, where the centre portion of the house is a hollow space for an in-house garden.

Apart from private homes, ArchiTours will also visit Treelodge@Punggol housing estate, which is HDB's first ecofriendly precinct and the newly opened National University of Singapore University Town which has research buildings and residential colleges sited around heritage trees.

The tours will also include office buildings such as 158 Cecil Street, which has been nicknamed the Hanging Garden in the CBD, because of the vertical greenery running down the building.

The tours cost \$35 to \$45 a person.

ArchiTours are one of the most popular events in Archifest, an annual architecture festival organised by the Singapore Institute of Architects (SIA). It began on Monday and will run till Oct 28.

Apart from ArchiTours, this year's festival features 60 events, including an ArchiFest Forum, which will appeal more to professional architects. Nine Singapore and foreign architects and academics will share their views on what common spaces mean to them.
